Online Collection

Sustained Silent Reading (or Everything and Read—DEAR) a period of uninterrupted quiet reading. It is based upon a single simple principle: Reading is a skill. And like all skills, the more you use it, the better you get at it.

Computer Activity

- Set aside a 10-15 minute period of time every week when all students do is read, but unlike the traditional approach, they select a story on the internet.
- Provide a list of websites (see below) that are appropriate. Give them one minute to select a story and get started.
- Students must read a story-oriented website, preferably a novel, history or biography for the entire period.
